Six commercial slots will run an hour, none of them

longer than one minute. Crashing raucus jingles are out and only messages that are literate and interesting will be used.




WANTS LETTERS

CKLG-FM's studio equipment requires delicate tuning to achieve the pure quality of sound which goes with FM stereo.

One example of this delicate bal-ance is the arms on the record turntables.

A knob controls the weight of the head which rests on the record.

When it is set at zero the head al-most floats.

The head cannot be too heavy or it creates surface noise and wears out the record.

If it is too light, the needle will skip.

Because of this danger the tables are weighted with 150 pounds of lead.

The weights make it virtually impossible to jar the turntable and skip the needle.


